Reader

Concerning the coming of Jesus Christ and our being gathered to meet our Saviour: we beg you, sisters and brothers, don't become easily agitated or disturbed by some prophecy, report or letter falsely attributed to us, which says that the day of our Saviour has come. Let no one deceive you, in any way. It cannot happen until the Great Falling Away occurs, and the rebel, the Lost One, has appeared. This is the Enemy, the one who claims to be so much greater than all that people call "God," greater than every object of worship—so much so that it enthrones itself in God's sanctuary and claims to be God. Surely you remember me telling you these things when I was with you?

But we ought to thank God always for you, sisters and brothers loved by Christ, because God chose you from the beginning to be saved by the sanctifying Spirit and by believing in the truth. God called you through our preaching of the Good News, so that you might gain the glory of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Therefore, sisters and brothers, stand firm. Hold fast to the traditions you received from us, either by word of mouth or by letter. May our Saviour Jesus Christ and our Abba God—who loved us and in mercy gave us eternal consolation and hope console your hearts and strengthen them for every good work and word. 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

Some Sadducees—the ones who claim there is no resurrection—came forward to pose this question: "Teacher, Moses wrote that if a man's brother dies leaving a wife and no child, the brother should marry the woman now widowed, to raise up children with her. Let's say that there were seven brothers. The first one married and died childless. The second brother then married the woman, then the third, and so on. All seven died without leaving her any children. Finally the woman herself died. At the resurrection, who will be her husband? Remember, seven married her." Jesus said to them, "The children of this age marry each other, but those judged worthy of a place in the age to come and of the resurrection from the dead don't take husbands or wives. They can no longer die, like the angels—they are children of God, since they are children of the resurrection. That the dead rise again was even demonstrated by Moses when, in the passage about the bush, he called the Most High 'the God of Sarah and Abraham, and the God of Rebecca and Isaac, and the God of Leah and Rachel and Jacob.' God is not the God of the dead, but of the living. All are alive to God." Luke 20:27-38

In all things he fulfilled your gracious will.

On the night he freely gave himself to death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Gracious God, his perfect sacrifice destroys the power of sin and death; by raising him to new life you give us life for evermore. Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith.

Presider Recalling his death, proclaiming his resurrection, and looking for his coming again in glory, we offer you, God, this bread and this cup. Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts, that all who eat and drink at this table may be one body and one holy people, a living sacrifice in Jesus Christ, our Lord.
